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Drama club and lessons We are delighted to inform you that Miss Martin has been successful in her auditions for a new production called 'Cold War' which will be performed at the Almeida Theatre. We have recruited a replacement for her - Mr Taylor - who is in the process of completing all pre-employment checks and training and will be joining us after half term. Mrs Botchwey will continue the Drama club until his arrival and the individual LAMDA lessons will be re-scheduled on some additional days after half term. Thank you for your understanding.

New Menu After half term, Mrs Jacobs will be rolling out the new winter menu. Preparing and cooking food for 120 people, ensuring it is tasty, healthy and suitable for all is a challenging job and we are grateful for her hard work. Mrs Jacobs will be trialing some of the new dishes by sharing little samples of some of the dishes next week, in order to receive feedback (no pun intended!) before the new menu is rolled out after half term.

This week In Monday's assembly we considered the importance of thinking about Black History whenever we study any unit of work and not just in October but that it is also important to highlight Black History this month because there is still work to do to ensure everyone is treated equally.

EYFS have been practicing the correct formation of letters, exploring length measuring who is the tallest and who is the shortest in our class. We will keep this data and compare later on in the year and see how much the children have grown. They also had an exciting time visiting the science museum. They looked at a pumpkin on Thursday to identify the different parts and today they have been making pumpkin soup just like in the book that they have been reading this week 'Pumpkin Soup' – delicious!

Form 1 For English this week, the children designed their own gingerbread house and then wrote full sentences independently, making sure to use an adjective and 'and'. The children have also looked at what morals are and what morals can be learned from the story of Hansel and Gretel. The children have continued to look at 1 more and 1 less than a given 2- and 3-digit numbers in Maths. We have also been comparing numbers using the greater than, less than and equals symbols. For Science, the children have been learning how to look at the different leaves on trees to work out whether they are deciduous or evergreen. In Topic, the children used their compass knowledge to direct each other around the playground. They used their knowledge of maps to create their own, which the other children then used to direct themselves around. Form 1's DT was very exciting this week; the children have worked in small groups to construct a small habitat out of lolly sticks.

Form 2 have been learning how to write a formal letter, developing their understanding of multiplication and division and carried out an experiment to test the suitability of different materials for various uses. Amongst other things, they discovered that card spoons don't last very long! The children have also been researching the countries involved in the Rugby World cup and have found some interesting facts.

Form 3 have been writing diary entries from a character's point of view (Odysseus, a crew mate and Scyllar the dragon). In Maths they have been make 'the whole' with fractions. In Science they looked at water resistance and surface tension by floating paperclips on the surface of water. In RE they looked at the similarities between Islam and other faiths and created a poster to promote tolerance and respect of other people's beliefs. In Topic the children continued writing Ancient Greek Myths and loved hearing about Theseus and the Minotaur. They also discussed how many Greek Myths were designed to instil the values of humility in their protagonists. The children also listened to each other's presentations for Black History month. Today the children have been comparing Greek and African vase design and learning to make a clay pot.

Form 4 have carried out a science investigation into evaporation - testing whether hot, cold or tepid water evaporates more quickly. We also did a virtual tour of the National Gallery looking at stories within different paintings and making our own copies of these famous works of art, in preparation for our trip on Monday. In maths, we learnt about long multiplication methods and applied these to solving word problems. In English, we looked at conjunctions, clauses, commas, personification and alliteration, trying to use these elements in our own writing. Our homework was a description based on the Iron Man. We also began to research Black History through the personal story of Floella Benjamin's book 'Coming to England.'

Form 5 In English lessons, we have been learning to describe a setting using high-level vocabulary whilst stimulating different senses. We have also looked at building suspense in our sentences to engage the reader. In Topic lessons, we have looked at the ethics behind using animals to test space travel and had a class debate on the pros and cons of this process. In Science, we have been studying the Moon's phases and using unique methods to represent this such as using cookies to create a lunar month. In Maths lessons, Form 5 have been learning about factors and multiples.

Form 6 In Maths, Form 6 have been simplifying and collecting algebraic terms. In their Guided Reading, the children have been analysing the poem 'The Caged Bird' by Maya Angelou in line with National Poetry day. In Topic, they have been researching different species in the Polar Regions and how climate change has impacted their survival. On Tuesday, Form 6 enjoyed their trip to the Science museum including the wonder lab for their unit on light. In Dance, they are continuing their storytelling through interpretive dance. They have also been thinking about significant figures of Black British History (from the Moors to Baroness Amos).

Next Week All children will be conducting their wonder sessions in which they generate questions for their learning next half term.

On Monday, Form 4 are visiting the National Gallery and the children in school will have a visit from Zengha Wellings-Longmore from the RAF museum who will be telling the fantastic story of Sam King and other WW2 Heroes to continue our focus on Black History Month.

On Wednesday we are celebrating British Values Day in school. Please be aware that whilst we try to intertwine our special event days with the children's learning, this can mean adjustments to the lessons they have in the day. This week Upper School children will still have their Gymnastics session at Hendon Leisure centre so children will need to be in their PE kit.

Also on Wednesday – Please remind your child to bring in their Topic homework.

On Thursday we will have the Topic Homework walk about which you are welcome to join from 8.10 - 8.40. On Thursday, Form 4 and their parents are invited to the Longtown residential information evening at 3.45pm. Friday is the last day of the half term and children return to school on Monday 30th October.

Apologies for any confusion This week Mrs Mbah introduced Black History month in Monday's assembly and told the children about the projects they would be doing on Wednesday afternoon - asking them to have a little think about who they might like to study and said they could look up a few facts ready for the lesson. This was not a homework per say but rather a 'be mindful of what's coming up' comment. We understand this has caused confusion as several children have come home with a 'homework' request to parents without any communication from the school and some even did the whole report they were supposed to do in school on Wednesday. We are very impressed with the effort, love how diligent they have been and how enthusiastic the children are about Black History Month, however, that was not Mrs Mbah's expectation.

We often mention things the children can do at home in assembly to expand their knowledge - such as last week when Father Steven talked about vegetables, the children were encouraged, next time they are at the supermarket, to try and find out the name of a vegetable they didn't know before or in the Autumn assembly, Mrs Mbah suggested looking for signs of Autumn and said they could take a photo or draw a picture. If children do something above and beyond, they get rewarded with House points, shooting stars etc. but these are optional extras and not a homework expectation.

Synagogue Visit On Thursday, as part of their R.E and Worldviews curriculum coverage, Form 1 and Form 5 visited the Mill Hill Synagogue sukkah. They were very lucky to have Mr John Mitchell, an experienced educator, to talk to the children about the Festival of Sukkot. The festival reminds Jewish people about a time when they did not have permanent dwellings and so they built temporary huts in which they lived and slept. The sukkahs are often elaborately decorated with fruit and vegetables as well as pictures and paintings. Mr. Mitchell introduced the children to the 'lulav' and 'etrog' and the four species of plants which remind Jews of the variety of fruit and vegetation that was on offer in the Holy Land. Form 1 children also delivered some beautiful pictures related to sukkot which they and the Form 2 children had drawn. These will be displayed in Mill Hill synagogue.
