A huge well done to you all.

**Golden Tea** is an opportunity for children to show the work they have completed this week of which they are most proud, whilst enjoying juice and biscuits together. The following children will meet with Mrs Wilson during morning break-time on Monday -

**This week** EYFS have been reading their core text, Oliver's vegetables, and writing about different vegetables and fruit. They have been exploring unusual fruit and vegetables in a variety of ways and even used fruits to paint with. During Communication and Language sessions, the children expanded their sentences to reason 'why' and in Maths the children continued with their number recognition. In knowledge and understanding of the world, the children thought about healthy eating including how to make a colourful rainbow plate and all thoroughly enjoyed their Welly Wednesday activities in Mill Hill Park including using sticks and leaves to make insects! During PE, the children worked on their balance by standing up tall whilst walking along rubber tracks. The children also loved listening to stories about Jesus during their RE lesson.

Form 1 have been reading 'Where the wild things are and thinking about the main character's feelings at each stage of the story. They have been looking closely at the illustrations and answering retrieval questions. The children have been using standard and non-standard measures for different containers and thinking about fractions by saying whether the container is empty, ¼, ½ or ¾ full. The children enjoyed thinking about whether dinosaurs are herbivore, carnivore or omnivores and making dishes for them in their Kid's Kitchen activity. In Science, Form 1 categorised animals e.g. reptiles, mammals, fish etc. and this linked to their Art in which they made making pencil sketches of dinosaurs. For Topic, they learned about Mary Anning by watching a video and extracting answers to key questions. During Computing, the children used Beebots and explored the controls by writing a simple algorithm to reach their partner.

Form 2 enjoyed their wow session on Monday when they built castles out of a range of different biscuits! They needed to think carefully about which biscuits would help them to build each part of the castle. They have continued the theme of Normans by learning about the Battle of Hastings as well as thinking about how they could build a siege tower. In English Form 2 wrote poems and are learning how to use conjunctions to join co-ordinating sentences or phrases together. During Maths lessons, they continued to extend their abilities to calculate using column methods for addition and subtraction.

Form 3 had their WOW Day making stone age dens and listening to a range of sound stimulus including wolves, mammoths, frogs, rainstorm, sabretooth tigers, wild dogs and roaring winds. They used this in their English to formulate wonderful descriptive writing pieces. In Maths, the children have been identifying horizontal, vertical and parallel lines, angles and turns. In Science, they categorised natural and man-made light sources and set up an investigation over time to see how light affects sugar paper. During Computing, Form 3 leaned to change font size, colour and style as well as sourcing images to create a variety of documents such as party invites. In DT the children designed their wheeled vehicles with axels. In RE, the children thought about what rules disciples had to follow and in RSHE they have been thinking about changes in their life.

Form 4 have been referring to their core text 'Demon Dentist' to find evidence for inferences and extracting key words and phrases they could use to help their own writing when they describe their own demon villain. In Maths, Form 4 have finished their work on fractions and moved onto algebraic formula by simplifying terms and multiplying adding and subtracting integers. In Science, Form 4 have been thinking about how teeth are made, identifying types of teeth and considering their structure. During their Art lesson, the children looked at Holbein portrait paintings to understand the features of a face and to observe Tudor clothing which links nicely to their Tudor topic in which they are researching arguments for and against Henry VIII being a good king. In RSHE, Form 4 thought about how they might feel and what might happen if they did not reach a dream or goal and how they would move forward.

During English lessons, Form 5 have been considering and writing balanced arguments about mechanicals' rights in Cogheart and presenting this in a range of ways, some of which will be shared with the author. In Maths, the children converted fractions decimals and percentages using larger multiplications beyond their tables. In Topic, they have been researching the effects of the industrial revolution in chosen areas such as: trade, industry, transport, pollution and disease and considering the reliability of their sources. In Science, Form 5 have been conducting the experiments they designed. In Computing, they have been coding crumbles to control traffic lights.

In Form 6 English, the children have finished editing the whole school show script with personalised lines and jokes for everyone to enjoy at the end of term. In Maths, they have been taking responsibility for their own learning by considering their objectives and identifying their own areas of weakness, then creating a learning plan to help them improve these and using it to develop their skills. In Art the children learned about shading techniques including cross-hatching, stippling and scumbling to draw a still life from a close, closer and closest perspective. In Computing, Form 6 have been learning about computing systems and networks including variables. In Topic, Form 6 have continued their unit on trade links by thinking about how these have changed over time. In French, they have been practising asking for and giving directions. The highlight of the Form 6 week has been their very exciting trip to Verulamium where they had a superb hands-on experience evaluating primary sources and considering the uses of different artefacts.

**Swimming** Form 3 and 4 begin their intensive swimming lessons course on Monday. Please refer to the separate letter for details of what you need to bring and the adaptations to the timetables. Some parents have raised concerns about swimming at this time of year. Please be reassured that cold weather cannot cause colds as these are viral; swimming, however, can cause temporary nasal congestion due to irritation of the nasal passages and we teach children to blow out of their nose to limit this. If you find your child has nasal congestion, please consider using nose clips or speaking to the doctor about a nasal spray. All children are asked to wear a swimming hat and this will limit how wet hair gets, however, if you are very concerned about this, please speak directly with the class teacher to ensure they get out with enough time to dry their hair. We are also requesting that all children bring their hat, scarf and gloves to ensure they do not get cold between the pool and the coach and during the walk from the coach to school. Once children arrive back at school, they will be served their warm lunch before playing outside.
