A huge congratulations to the winners of the World Book Day costume competition. Well done to **Max, Amba** and **Bhim, Elenor** and **Ilias.** Well done too to **Zakariya** and **Victoria** who won the 'Guess the Book Character competition!' We hope you enjoy your gift voucher and treats.

Thank you parents for helping your children to collect sponsors for the sponsored walk. A prize was awarded to the child in the class who raised the most money. Well done – **Jayden R, Reuben, Alessandro, Dylan, Noah G, Hashini and Mia L**. Special mention must also go to **Beau, Ariana** and **Anoushka** who showed kindness and were especially helpful. We are delighted to announce that we have raised over £1500 – the final figure will be announced next week when the final monies have been received. AMAZING!

This Week EYFS has been an exciting week, they went on an adventure to explore worms and learnt about the different parts of a worm, why they don't have legs and how they aerate the soil to help our plants grow. They linked this to their drawing club work where they did the story 'Superworm'. In Maths the children focused on looking at quantities that are the same, more than, less than and equal to. In Language and Communication, EYFS did some rhyming and let their imaginations come alive in role play. The children are also really excited to report that their caterpillars are growing daily and are starting to spin! Hopefully, they will soon be snug and warm in their cocoons. We will keep you updated!

For English this week, the children in Form 1 wrote a recount about their school trip to the Tate Modern. They were also writing sentences to describe what type of character Traction Man and Scrubbing Brush are — characters from their core text. For Maths, Form 1 have started to look at halving 2d shapes and finding halves of even numbers. In Science, Form 1 found objects which are made up of more than one material. They then drew, labelled and wrote sentences about why different parts are made from different materials. During World Book Day, their work was based on the story 'The Great Kapok Tree'. We looked at why trees are important for the environment and for us and wrote about their findings.

Form 2 have been exploring mass and practising their times tables in Maths. They wrote the song that the whale might have sung to the snail to persuade her to travel the world with him in English and have written their own choice of story based on The Great Kapok Tree as part of World Book Day. Also, for World Book Day, they decorated the classroom window on the theme of Charlie and the Chocolate factory. They have categorised things by whether they are alive, dead or have never been alive as part of their science learning. For DT it was Form 2's Kids' Kitchen week for Food Technology and they made snail shell pastries.

This week, Form 3 have been finishing off non-fiction guides and posters based on The Wind in the Willows. They have made Rattie's Guide to the riverbank, posters and guides about River features and facts. Leaflets about picnics and Maps of the Riverbank and Wild Woods. In Maths, they have been working on 2 - step word problems and using bar models to represent them and looking at reflected shapes in Non-Verbal Reasoning. In RE, they learned about the 99 names of Allah and used their calligraphic skills to write some of them. In Science, they looked at water flow through a plant and in Topic they learned about the water cycle. They have also learned some useful watercolour brush techniques. All this and an exciting overnight trip to the Golden Hinde too!

Form 4 have covered reflection and translation in shapes with given co-ordinates for their Maths this week. In English, they have been looking at persuasive speeches in the trial of the Knave of Hearts. Victorian cartoon drawings from the original publication of Alice in Wonderland, have been the focus in Art. Whilst in Topic, co-ordinates on maps and using them to find locations have been keeping the children engaged. In science, Form 4 looked at liquids and solids and how density and viscosity affect them - a fair test on 3 different liquids looking at these qualities, proved very successful.

Form 5 looked analysed poetry which uses a range of figurative language. They then wrote their own figurative language to stimulate a variety of senses. They are beginning to plan their own poems in their choice of poetic structure which are rich in vocabulary and imagery to describe ancient Egypt. In Guided Reading, they analysed extracts from Secrets of a Sun King and discussed the impact of Emma Carroll's language. The children used P.E.E. to explain the effect of vocabulary and punctuation. Form 5 looked at sources (ancient wall paintings from within pyramids) and inferred meanings about the Egyptian belief in the afterlife. They discussed the difference between primary and secondary sources then created their own texts to explain the journey to the Hall of Judgment using what they had learnt from their sources. In Computing, they looked at coding to understand how to use conditions to make a sprite move. They analysed a game, whilst trying to represent the algorithm of what they were playing. They then used selection to code their own sprites to respond to different inputs. For World Book Day, the whole school read the Great Kapok Tree and discussed the moral of the story. Form 5 then chose their own piece of writing which ranged from poetry to narrative writing to playscript writing based on a rainforest. The outcomes were all unique and of a high-quality. Form 5 also voted on their door design of a book cover and have created a collage of all 4 books from the Cogheart series.

Form 6 have enjoyed Bikeability all this week. They are now aware of the importance of road safety and worked really hard to acquire the necessary skills for safe cycling. In science, they used their prior knowledge to create a zoo - ensuring that they are classifying animal enclosures based on their living habitats. Their research included differentiating between prey and predators. The children were also thrilled to finally be taking their production onto the Hartley Hall stage for the first rehearsal and it's excellent to see it all coming together!
