We are looking forward to welcoming Abe Gibson, a published performance poet, dramatist, and actor to school on Monday. He will be leading workshops and presenting assembly with links to themes of Black History. Abe has been a writer in residence at the London Transport Museum, featured on BBC Radio 4 and performed at the Poetry Café, Ronnie Scott's, and the Hackney Empire.

Abe has led writing workshops with many organisations including Feltham Young Offenders, for young people who have been excluded from school. Abe is currently Poet in Residence at Starksfield School in Edmonton and performs workshops at schools, colleges and libraries across London. We are looking forward to welcoming him on Monday!

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## This week at St Martin's

This week in **EYFS** the children have been hard at work using their phonic knowledge to decode and write words. We have started doing 'beginning addition' using the concept of taking two object and adding them together to make a number. In PSED we have been sprinkling a little bit of kindness and learning how to be compassionate and empathetic towards each other. EYFS made delicious pumpkin soup to eat alongside their lunch today to link with our core text 'Pumpkin Soup'.

**Form 1** have been using their English lessons to celebrate Black History Month by learning about the achievements of the footballer Marcus Rashford, the explorer Matthew Henson and nurse Mary Seacole. We have also been learning about morals. The children have been thinking about the morals for 'The Boy Who Cried Wolf' and 'Hansel and Gretel' and what they can learn from them.

During Maths lessons, Form 1 learnt the symbols and the names for greater than, less than and equals to. They then had to use this knowledge to work out whether numbers were greater than, less than or equal to each other, whilst using the appropriate mathematical symbols.

During Computing lessons, the children continued their internet safety work ensuring they know how to keep themselves safe when online. We discussed what type of information we can share and what we shouldn't tell others about ourselves, our lives and our families.

In Science this week, Form 1 have extended their knowledge about their topic, 'Plants' by learning about evergreen and deciduous trees. They studied their features to determine which trees can be placed into each category. The children really enjoyed working together on their investigations.

This week, **Form 2** have considered the unkind actions of one of the characters from their book and have written formal letters to him to complain about his behaviour. They have been deepening their understanding of multiplication in Maths alongside their weekly times table test. They carried out their experiments in Science, learning about different materials and their characteristics. Form 2 have concluded that paper is not a good material for a product if it is going to get wet! They have continued to build their lighthouses in art and have spoken about the weather in their French lessons.

This week, **Form 3** have been looking at Poetry in their English lessons. They have delighted in the poems of Michael Rosen, Neal Zetter and brought in favourites of their own. They have enjoyed reading aloud and have also begun to write poems of their own. In Maths, they enjoyed cutting up tasty things into equal parts and creating fractions, linking them to concepts of unit and non-unit fractions and adding and subtracting them. Tasty stuff! They enjoyed apples and honey in RE as part of their Rosh Hashana celebration and also learned about the 5 pillars of Islamic faith. They also managed to survive our Stone Age Survival workshop on Hampstead Heath, where they learned fire







lighting and shelter building skills. Their behaviour was impeccable and we are incredibly proud of them. What a busy week of learning! Well done Form 3!

In English, **Form 4** focused on how to write dialogue using direct speech and associated punctuation. They also focused on word problems in Maths; particularly word-problems involving division with remainders, where one needs to decide whether to use the remainder in the answer. Form 4 also covered negative numbers and how to use them in context. During Topic lessons, they learned about the formation of mountains and also studied 1950's immigration through the story of Floella Benjamin. Form 4 celebrated Rosh Hashanah during RS and painted winter scenes for Art, using watercolours. We have also presented our own individual research for Black History month as well as Homework-based research about our own family histories.

In IT we have looked at how to present a book review using publisher. Science lessons have allowed us to apply the ideas and key words we have learnt to the water-cycle.

This week, in English, **Form 5** have continued to study how their vocabulary and grammar choices can impact their reader. They have used high-level vocabulary and figurative language to describe a setting as well as how to build suspense through use of quick successive clauses, having looked at how the author of Cosmic did so within our class text. In Topic, Form 5 wanted to learn about Laika the dog and her impact on the Space Program. They discussed the ethics of whether animals should have been used in space exploration and have written persuasive texts based on their opinions. In their Science lesson, the children have looked at the relationship between the Earth and the Sun and how this causes day and night as well as the different seasons. They have written scripts to perform and display their knowledge on this subject. In French, the children have continued to learn how adjectives agree with their nouns in the singular and plural as well as how to use intensifiers such as 'very' and 'quite' when describing the planets. In Computing, Form 5 have continued to communicate only using the internet, creating a share point about their chosen aspect of Space, and learning how to embed videos and soundbites into their information. Form 5 visited the Science Museum on Wednesday where they looked at artefacts from the Space Race as well as how astronauts live in Space. In addition, they visited the IMAX cinema where they were able to view the Earth in 3D from the Internation Space Station. Thursday was World Poetry Day and Form 5 have written powerful and descriptive poetry based on Space which they will share with our visiting poet on Monday, Abe Gibson. Another fantastic week of Maths learning for Form 5 too. They began their new unit - using their addition and subtraction skills to problem solve reasoning questions. They have also been investigating common factors.

In English, **Form 6** completed some timed composition writing with the aim of entertaining their audience using their choice of stimulus. They used a range of features including imagery which stimulates different senses as well as punctuation for emphasis. Thursday was World Poetry Day

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and Form 6 wrote powerful and descriptive poetry based on winter and the Northern Lights which they will share with our visiting poet on Monday, Abe Gibson. In Latin, Form 6 have translated a story from English into Latin with a focus on translating subordinate clauses using their previously learnt subordinating conjunctions.

This week, Form 6 visited the Science Museum and explored the interactive gallery 'Who Am I?' and watched the 3-D film 'Antarctica'. The children thoroughly enjoyed the trip and came back with a plethora of new information to support their learning.

During Maths lessons, the children are working through individualized and targeted 11+ papers and have been solving Maths mysteries linked to both Non Verbal Reasoning and quadrants.

As part of Black History month, Form 6 have explored inspirational figures and the positive impact that they have made in today's society. This allowed for some fascinating discussion and insights.
